

All In One Bin Paper Stream Recycling

*It's time to put down those scissors,
and get rid of that twine.*

Ocean County residents in 2008 can toss all the materials that make up the recycling paper stream into one container with a lid for curbside pickup.

The items are junk mail, cardboard, newspapers with inserts, magazines, computer paper, office papers, empty brown paper bags and school papers.

Here is how it works:

-  Take all those items and place them all together in one 30 to 50 gallon container. No need to bundle, wrap, tape or bag. Cover the container with a lid, place at curb and recycle.
-  Items that should be excluded are cereal and pizza boxes, plastic bags, paper plates, and trash. Telephone books should be recycled separately. Cardboard should be broken down to fit the container.
-  While most towns will make the change beginning in February, some will begin the all in one bin paper stream recycling in January.
-  Residents should check with their local municipal recycling coordinators to find out when these changes will be coming to their town. Or, you can call the **Ocean County Department of Solid Waste Management** at **732-506-5047** for help.
-  Don't forget Ocean County has dual stream recycling so while your paper stream will now go into one container, keep a second container for ALL bottles and cans.
